(1) Calendar year. Baseline is current law. Proposal would repeal the following Affordable Care Act (ACA) taxes: the 3.8 percent Net Investment Income Tax; the 0.9 percent additional HI tax; the excise tax on employers offering inadequate health insurance coverage; the excise tax on individuals without adequate health insurance; the increase in threshold for medical expense deductions; excise taxes on health insurance providers, pharmaceutical manufacturers and importers, and medical device manufacturers and importers; and the Premium Tax Credit. The proposal would delay the Cadillac tax until 2025 and enact a new age-related health insurance tax credit. Analysis excludes changes to Health Savings Accounts and Medical Flexible Spending Accounts. Analysis captures impact of coverage changes on credits but does not include the impact of changes in premiums or the welfare impact of changes in health insurance coverage or coverage generosity. Simulations of health insurance credits calibrated to match results from Urban Institute's Health Insurance Policy Simulation Model (HIPSM).
