(1) Proposal would repeal the following ACA taxes: 3.8 percent net investment income tax; 0.9 percent additional Medicare hospital insurance tax; excise tax on employers offering inadequate health insurance coverage; excise tax on individuals without adequate health insurance; increase in the threshold for medical expense deductions; and excise taxes on health insurance providers, pharmaceutical manufacturers and importers, and medical device manufacturers and importers. The bill would also modify the premium tax credit. Analysis excludes changes to health savings accounts and medical flexible spending accounts. Analysis captures change in taxes and credits but does not include the impact of changes in premiums or the welfare impact of changes in health insurance coverage or coverage generosity. Simulations of health insurance credits calibrated to match results from Urban Institute's Health Insurance Policy Simulation Model (HIPSM). For a description of TPC's current law baseline,
